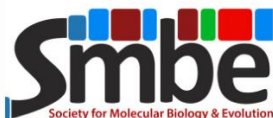

## FINAL REPORT

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## Symposium Overview

The OneBioAfrica 2026 Symposium (<https://onebioafrica.com/>) was held from 12 to 16 July 2026 in Cotonou, Benin, bringing together 109 participants from 15 countries: Algeria, Benin, Burkina Faso, Cameroon, Côte d'Ivoire, France, Morocco, Nigeria, Togo, Tunisia, Uganda, the United States of America, Pakistan, Rwanda, and Switzerland. Participants included researchers, academics, students, policymakers, conservation practitioners, and international technical and financial partners, providing a diverse platform for scientific exchange and collaboration under the One Health framework. The symposium provided a multidisciplinary platform for presenting and discussing recent advances and emerging research trends in molecular biology, genomics, bioinformatics, biodiversity conservation, environmental health, and disease surveillance. The programme included keynote lectures by internationally recognized scientists, oral and poster presentations, panel discussions, networking activities, and an intensive hands-on bioinformatics workshop. A dedicated session, "SMBE Opportunities for African Researchers: Funding, Publications, Networking and Career Development Roundtable," introduced participants to SMBE funding opportunities, publication and journal opportunities, membership, scientific networking, and career development pathways. The scientific programme highlighted the importance of integrating molecular approaches into biodiversity conservation, public health, veterinary medicine, agriculture, and environmental management. Participants presented research addressing major One Health challenges, including antimicrobial resistance, zoonotic diseases, conservation genetics, microbial ecology, food safety, environmental pollution, and ecosystem restoration. The diversity of participants and scientific contributions demonstrated the importance of multidisciplinary and collaborative approaches to addressing complex health, environmental, and biodiversity challenges across Africa. A major achievement of the symposium was the strengthening of research capacity, scientific networking, and international collaboration among African and international researchers. The event also recognized scientific excellence through Best Oral Presentation and Best Poster Presentation awards, while certificates of attendance were provided to participants in recognition of their active engagement. The symposium further resulted in the development and finalization of the Cotonou Declaration, which consolidates key recommendations emerging from the scientific discussions and provides

a strategic framework for future actions in molecular research in Africa, biodiversity conservation, One Health, scientific capacity strengthening, knowledge exchange, and regional and international research collaboration.

## 1. Introduction

Africa continues to face interconnected challenges related to biodiversity loss, emerging infectious diseases, climate change, antimicrobial resistance, environmental degradation, food insecurity, and declining ecosystem health. Addressing these complex and interconnected challenges requires integrated scientific approaches that recognize the close relationships among humans, animals, plants, microorganisms, and their shared environment.

The OneBioAfrica Symposium was established as a platform to promote interdisciplinary scientific collaboration and strengthen research capacity in molecular biology, genomics, bioinformatics, biodiversity, and evolutionary sciences across Africa. The 2026 edition, held in Cotonou, Benin, brought together 109 participants from 15 countries, including researchers, academics, students, policymakers, conservation practitioners, and international technical and financial partners. The symposium provided an opportunity for participants to present and discuss recent scientific advances, exchange knowledge and expertise, develop new collaborations, and explore practical applications of molecular and genomic approaches to One Health challenges. The scientific programme brought together diverse fields, including environmental sciences, veterinary medicine, public health, biodiversity conservation, microbiology, molecular ecology, agriculture, genomics, and bioinformatics.

Beyond scientific exchange, the symposium placed particular emphasis on capacity building and career development for African researchers, including practical training in bioinformatics and dedicated discussions on funding, publications, networking, and career opportunities through the Society for Molecular Biology and Evolution (SMBE). These activities contributed to strengthening connections between African researchers and the broader international scientific community. Through scientific presentations, keynote lectures, technical sessions, poster presentations, hands-on training, panel discussions, and networking activities, OneBioAfrica 2026 provided a multidisciplinary environment for advancing collaboration and promoting integrated approaches to current and emerging challenges affecting ecosystems, animal health, and human well-being.

This report presents the main activities conducted during the OneBioAfrica 2026 Symposium, as well as the scientific contributions, achievements, key outcomes,

recommendations, and future perspectives emerging from the event. It also highlights lessons learned from the organization of the symposium and opportunities for strengthening the long-term engagement and representation of African researchers within international scientific networks.

### 3. Symposium Proceedings

#### 3.1. *Registration, Welcome Diner, and Networking*

The symposium began with participant registration and badge collection, followed by welcoming remarks and a networking reception on 12 July 2026. These activities facilitated interactions among participants from different institutions and countries, creating opportunities for scientific exchange and future collaboration. Networking was recognized as a key component of the symposium, contributing to interdisciplinary partnerships, knowledge sharing, and the development of future collaborative research initiatives.

### 3.2. Opening Ceremony

The official opening ceremony of the OneBioAfrica Symposium, held on 13 July 2026, marked the beginning of the event. The session highlighted the importance of strengthening African scientific leadership and developing innovative, data-driven approaches to address emerging environmental, biological, and public health challenges. The opening ceremony brought together prominent scientists, academic leaders, and representatives of research institutions, including Prof. Nourou Souleymane Yorou from *Agence Béninoise pour la Recherche et l'Innovation (ABRI)*, Prof. Brice Sinsin from *Université d'Abomey-Calavi (UAC)*, Dr. Jean Legeay from *Université Mohammed VI Polytechnique (Morocco)*, Kilsa Borgbara from *Inquaba Biotec West Africa (Nigeria)*, and Dr. Boris Olou, Chair of the Symposium. The speakers emphasized the importance of strengthening collaboration among African universities, research institutions, governments, biotechnology organizations, and international partners to build sustainable scientific capacities.

The ceremony concluded with a shared commitment to advancing African-led scientific innovation, strengthening research capacities, and promoting One Health approaches to address challenges at the interface of human health, animal health, and environmental sustainability, while recognizing the key role of early-career researchers in shaping the future of African science. The high-level speakers emphasized the importance of strengthening collaboration among African universities, research institutions, governments, biotechnology organizations, and international partners to build sustainable scientific capacities. The ceremony concluded with a shared commitment to advancing African-led scientific innovation, strengthening research capacities, and promoting One Health approaches to address challenges at the interface of human health, animal health, and environmental sustainability, while recognizing the key role of early-career researchers in shaping the future of African science. On behalf of the Government of Benin, the Director General of ABRI, Prof. Yorou officially launched the symposium and reaffirmed the commitment of national institutions to supporting scientific collaboration, innovation, and research development across Africa.

### 3.3. *Keynote Lectures*

The keynote and plenary programme constituted one of the scientific highlights of the SMBE Regional Symposium – OneBioAfrica 2026. Seven invited speakers from Africa, Europe and North America brought together complementary expertise spanning microbial ecology, conservation biology, genomics, bioinformatics, environmental biotechnology, artificial intelligence, sequencing technologies and One Health. This diversity of perspectives reflected the central ambition of OneBioAfrica: to connect molecular and computational approaches with real-world challenges affecting biodiversity, environmental sustainability and human and animal health. The lectures covered a broad scientific spectrum while remaining closely connected to the symposium's One Health and molecular biology objectives. Contributions ranged from practical bioinformatics and R-based community ecology analyses to advanced genomic surveillance, long-read sequencing and environmental DNA (eDNA) applications. Other presentations focused on



biodiversity conservation and threat assessment, microbial communities in constructed wetlands, wastewater treatment and reuse, antimicrobial resistance, and the integration of human, animal and environmental health perspectives. Several presentations demonstrated how molecular and genomic tools are increasingly moving beyond laboratory applications to support environmental monitoring, conservation decision-making and public-health surveillance. The sessions also highlighted the value of combining field observations, ecological data, molecular markers, sequencing technologies, artificial intelligence and bioinformatics to generate actionable evidence. In this respect, the plenary programme illustrated the interdisciplinary nature of contemporary biological research and the importance of developing analytical and technological capacity among African researchers.

The geographical diversity of the speakers further strengthened the programme. The symposium welcomed physically and virtually experts working in Benin, Morocco, France, Switzerland, Nigeria and the United States, creating opportunities for knowledge exchange across institutions, career stages, scientific disciplines and research environments. The lectures therefore served not only as scientific presentations but also as platforms for networking, mentorship, collaboration and exposure to international research practices.

**Prof. Brice Sinsin:** introduced IUCN STAR metrics as a framework for assessing and reducing threats to endangered species. The presentation connected quantitative conservation assessment with evidence-based strategies for biodiversity protection and demonstrated the relevance of robust indicators to conservation planning.

**Prof. Lara Urban:** explored the use of genomic technologies and artificial intelligence for One Health surveillance. Her presentation illustrated how microbial genomics, large-scale data analysis and AI can contribute to the early detection and monitoring of biological threats across interconnected health domains.

**Dr. Jean Legeay:** focused on practical bioinformatics and community ecology, with an emphasis on hands-on R-based analyses. His contribution reinforced the importance of reproducible computational workflows and accessible analytical skills for interpreting ecological and molecular datasets.

**Dr. Andrés Sauvêtre:** presented the role of microbial communities in constructed wetlands for wastewater treatment and reuse, connecting micropollutant removal with bioaugmentation and nature-based solutions. His presentation highlighted the potential of microbial processes to support more sustainable approaches to water management.

**Dr. Victorien Dougnon:** addressed One Health in the African context, emphasizing the links between human, animal and environmental health in confronting antimicrobial resistance and emerging infectious threats. The presentation highlighted the need for coordinated, cross-sectoral approaches to health surveillance and intervention.

**Dr. Rachel Meyer:** presented environmental DNA as a tool for assessing habitat health and introduced web-based resources that can support eDNA applications. Her contribution demonstrated how molecular biodiversity monitoring can complement traditional ecological approaches while also opening opportunities for broader participation through citizen science.

**Kilisi BORGBARA:** presented long-read sequencing and the application of the PacBio portfolio to human and environmental genomics. The contribution highlighted the growing relevance of high-resolution sequencing technologies for One Health research and for generating genomic information from diverse biological systems.

Taken together, the keynote lectures provided a coherent overview of how molecular biology, genomics and computational science can contribute to solving complex biological and societal challenges. The combination of conservation science, environmental biotechnology, microbial ecology, sequencing, AI, bioinformatics and One Health perspectives encouraged participants to look beyond disciplinary boundaries and consider integrated approaches to research and innovation. Importantly, the programme also demonstrated that African researchers and institutions are actively contributing to global scientific conversations while developing locally relevant solutions to challenges such as biodiversity loss, antimicrobial resistance, environmental degradation, water security and emerging infectious diseases. These lectures consequently strengthened the scientific, collaborative and capacity-building dimensions of OneBioAfrica 2026.

### 3.4. Technical and Scientific Session: Molecular Biology and Biodiversity Conservation

The first technical session focused on the application of molecular biology approaches to biodiversity conservation. Presentations addressed conservation genetics, DNA barcoding, microbial ecology, fungal diversity, forest restoration, and plant conservation. The studies presented demonstrated how molecular tools can improve species identification, assess genetic diversity, support ecosystem restoration, and strengthen conservation planning. Research on species such as *Pterocarpus erinaceus* and *Afzelia africana* highlighted the importance of integrating genetic information into conservation strategies. Other contributions focused on rhizosphere microbiomes, ectomycorrhizal fungi, mushroom cultivation, and freshwater biodiversity, demonstrating the importance of molecular approaches for understanding ecosystem processes.

### 3.5. Technical and Scientific Session: Molecular Approaches in Human and Animal Health

The second scientific session focused on molecular epidemiology, infectious diseases, zoonotic pathogens, and antimicrobial resistance, highlighting the contribution of molecular approaches

to understanding and managing health challenges. The presentations covered diverse topics, including HIV transmission genetics, bovine tuberculosis, wildlife-associated zoonotic pathogens, antimicrobial resistance, environmental surveillance, and molecular pathogen detection. These studies demonstrated the growing importance of molecular diagnostics and genomic surveillance in improving disease prevention, strengthening outbreak preparedness, and supporting evidence-based public health interventions within a One Health framework.

### *3.6. Technical and Scientific Session: Environment, Society and One Health*

The final scientific session explored the interconnected relationships between environmental quality, ecosystem health, and human well-being within the framework of the One Health approach. Presentations addressed a broad range of topics, including antimicrobial resistance in livestock, pesticide contamination, groundwater quality, waste management, fungal ecology, forest restoration, and urban air quality. These contributions highlighted the critical role of environmental monitoring, ecological assessment, and sustainable resource management in addressing complex health challenges. The session reinforced the importance of integrating environmental dimensions into One Health strategies to support evidence-based decision-making and promote healthier ecosystems and communities.

### *3.7. Poster Session*

The poster session provided a valuable platform for researchers and students to present their scientific findings, exchange knowledge, and engage with participants from diverse disciplines. The presented works covered a wide range of topics, including environmental surveillance, forest restoration, microbial ecology, reproductive biology, wildlife conservation, zoonotic diseases, and spatial ecology. The session fostered scientific discussions, constructive feedback, and networking opportunities, strengthening collaboration among researchers working across different fields within the One Health framework.

### *3.8. SMBE Opportunities for African Researchers: Funding, Publications, Networking and Career Development Roundtable*

This dedicated session introduced participants to the opportunities available through the Society for Molecular Biology and Evolution (SMBE), with a particular focus on supporting and increasing the engagement of African researchers within the Society. The presentation provided an overview



of SMBE funding opportunities, publication avenues and journals, membership options, scientific networking opportunities, and career development pathways. The session also highlighted the benefits of becoming actively involved in SMBE activities and encouraged participants to explore the Society's funding schemes, scientific meetings, publications, and professional networks. Particular emphasis was placed on opportunities available to early-career researchers and scientists based in Africa, including mechanisms that can facilitate research collaboration, participation in scientific meetings, and professional development. The session generated strong interest among participants and provided a direct platform for strengthening the connection between African researchers and the broader SMBE community. It also contributed to the symposium's broader objective of increasing African participation and representation within international molecular biology and evolutionary research networks.

### *3.9. Bioinformatics Workshop*

The bioinformatics workshop was one of the most practical and impactful components of the symposium, providing participants with hands-on training in computational approaches used in modern biological research. The sessions covered key topics, including an introduction to R programming, microbial ecology analysis, sequence quality control, bioinformatics pipelines, diversity analysis, ecological data visualization, and the interpretation of genomic datasets. Through practical exercises and interactive learning, the workshop strengthened participants' computational skills and enhanced their ability to analyze and interpret biological data.

### *3.10. Closing ceremony*

The closing ceremony marked the successful conclusion of the OneBioAfrica 2026 Symposium and provided an opportunity to recognize the contributions of participants and organizers. The session included an award ceremony celebrating scientific excellence, with prizes presented for the best poster presentation and best oral presentation, highlighting outstanding research contributions and effective scientific communication. The organizing committee was also recognized for its dedication and efforts in ensuring the success of the symposium. The ceremony concluded with the distribution of certificates to participants, presenters, and contributors, acknowledging their active engagement and commitment to advancing scientific collaboration and One Health research across Africa.

#### 4. Major Research Themes Emerging from OneBioAfrica 2026

The symposium highlighted several cross-cutting scientific themes reflecting the interdisciplinary vision of the One Health approach and the priorities for advancing research, innovation, and scientific capacity in Africa. The major themes emphasized during the symposium included:

- the application of molecular biology and genomic technologies for biodiversity conservation, enabling improved understanding, monitoring, and sustainable management of biological resources;
- the use of One Health approaches to address emerging infectious diseases, recognizing the interconnectedness between human health, animal health, and environmental systems.
- the growing importance of genomic surveillance and molecular epidemiology in improving pathogen detection, disease prevention, outbreak preparedness, and public health responses;
- the application of bioinformatics and data science tools to support biological research, genomic analysis, and evidence-based decision-making;
- the global challenge of antimicrobial resistance, including the need for innovative research strategies, surveillance systems, and sustainable solutions;
- the impacts of environmental pollution on ecosystem and human health, highlighting the importance of environmental monitoring and ecosystem protection;
- climate resilience, biodiversity conservation, and sustainable ecosystem management as essential strategies for addressing environmental challenges and supporting long-term sustainability;
- capacity building for African scientists, through training, mentorship, research infrastructure development, and knowledge transfer;
- strengthening international scientific collaboration to promote knowledge exchange, partnerships, and joint research initiatives; and
- translating research findings into policies and practical solutions to enhance the societal impact of scientific discoveries.



These themes reflected the commitment of OneBioAfrica to promoting African-led scientific innovation, strengthening research networks, and generating knowledge that contributes to sustainable development, improved health outcomes, and resilient ecosystems across the continent.

## 5. Cotonou Declaration and Future Commitments

The symposium culminated in the development and finalization of the Cotonou Declaration, a strategic document consolidating the key recommendations and commitments emerging from the scientific discussions and exchanges among participants. The Declaration provides a framework for future actions in molecular research, biodiversity conservation, One Health, scientific capacity strengthening, knowledge exchange, and regional and international research collaboration. It reflects the collective commitment of participants to strengthening scientific cooperation and advancing integrated, evidence-based approaches to addressing health, environmental, and biodiversity challenges in Africa (see the full declaration).

## 6. Conclusion

The OneBioAfrica Symposium 2026 successfully highlighted the transformative potential of molecular biology, genomics, bioinformatics, and interdisciplinary research in addressing Africa's interconnected environmental, health, and biodiversity challenges. By bringing together researchers, institutions, and stakeholders from diverse scientific fields, the symposium fostered knowledge exchange, strengthened collaborative networks, and promoted the practical implementation of the One Health approach across the continent. The scientific programme showcased innovative advances in biodiversity conservation, infectious disease surveillance, antimicrobial resistance monitoring, environmental genomics, and ecosystem restoration. The bioinformatics workshop enhanced participants' analytical skills and promoted the use of data-driven approaches in biological research, while networking and career development activities contributed to nurturing the next generation of African scientists. Overall, OneBioAfrica 2026 reaffirmed the importance of sustained investment in research infrastructure, scientific training, and regional and international partnerships to address Africa's complex challenges. The symposium concluded with a collective commitment to translating scientific discoveries into

evidence-based solutions that support biodiversity conservation, public health protection, ecosystem resilience, and sustainable development across Africa.
